Steiner Cabins Celebration at Mt. Hood Cultural Center & Museum

The Mt. Hood Cultural Center & Museum will host a special **Steiner Cabins Celebration Open House** on **Saturday, October 18, from 1:00 to 3:30 pm**. A featured presentation by filmmaker and Steiner Cabin owner **Ian McCluskey** will begin at 2:00 pm. The event is both a chance to learn more about Mt. Hood's history and a way to support ongoing preservation of these iconic log cabins.

Raffle tickets are \$25 each and can be purchased at the museum bookstore (in person or online) and during the event. Look for Steiner Book Fundraiser at: mthoodmuseum.org/product-category/books. Winners do not need to be present.

The afternoon will include a **fundraising raffle** with many Mt. Hood-themed prizes. Lucky winners may walk away with an overnight stay in an authentic Steiner built cabin, a private tour of the historic Fogelbo Steiner Log Home in Portland and lunch at the Nordic NW/Soder Broder cafe, watercolor prints by local artist Steve Ludemann, or an advance certificate for a forthcoming book featuring Steiner cabins.

Guest speaker **Ian McCluskey**—a Steiner Cabin owner, filmmaker, and storyteller—will share the fascinating history of these hand-built log cabins and preview the upcoming coffee table book, *Steiner Cabins: History and Style of a Mt. Hood Icon*. McCluskey, a self-taught carpenter, who personally restored a 1930 Steiner Cabin using only traditional hand tools, has a unique perspective on the artistry and endurance of Henry Steiner's work. He is no stranger to storytelling—Ian has worked for more than a decade with Oregon Public Broadcasting and has earned national recognition for his films, which have been shown at festivals around the world.
